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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

Record keeping in high school athletics has always been difficult to achieve. Coaches are not famous for their ability to keep records in the first place, and their time is usually consumed with activities, leaving little time for the chore of keeping records.

In trying to find a record of past football games played by Magnolia High School, it was learned that there was no such information readily available at this school. It was necessary to search the past annuals published by the school, research old newspapers, and interview the present coach, H. H. Swann, before the information was ascertained. By presenting a chronologue of this information, it will be readily available when needed. It is felt that this information will be helpful to future coaches at Magnolia High School, as well as to future athletes of Magnolia. This information will also be of interest to the school administration and to the community. It is also felt that this study may serve as a base to which football information may be added each year. In order to get an annual accounting of the football records for 1971, a Football Brochure for the 1971 season was compiled by the writer. This brochure includes statistics for all of District 25 A, of which Magnolia was a member in 1971. The brochure has been placed in the Magnolia Library and in the Athletic Department records and may be used as a guide in the future for organizing annual football information.

There have been times when football has been said to be unimportant in the high schools and that more time should be spent on the academic

subjects rather than football. However, some correlation between football ability and social acceptance has been established. In their study of the validity of a football rating scale and its relationship to social integration and academic ability, Cowell and Ismail(15) concluded that the social integration of the football squad increases according to the length of time the players play together. The social integration of the football squad appears to be affected by intense competition for places on the team. While football and academic abilities are independent, football ability and social acceptance are related.

According to Ratliff(54), the first record of high school football played in Texas was in 1900. At that time the team was not sponsored by the high school; in fact, the superintendent of schools in Dallas would not even permit the boys to practice on the school grounds. This first recorded Texas high school team was at "Dalhi" Dallas. Reports are that the playing suits for that first game were made by the boy's mothers and stuffed with cotton for padding. Two girls attended this first game, in contrast to the many girls who now attend and belong to pep squads and drill teams to encourage the players.

It was from this inconspicuous beginning that the ever-growing sport of high school football has sprung. The University Interscholastic League(14) added football to their program of activities in 1921. The University Interscholastic League was actually formed in 1910 as a Debating League of Texas High Schools. In 1912 it expanded its program by taking over the functions of the Interscholastic Athletic Association, which at that time governed track and field meets. The League is in the form of a service offered annually by the Bureau of Public School Service, and has a shifting membership from year to year. During the 1969-70

school year, 2,691 schools registered for participation in league contests. Its purpose is to organize and direct, through the medium of properly supervised and controlled contests, desirable school activities, and thereby assist in preparing students for citizenship. The best teams were established each year by the University Interscholastic League officials from statistics on the game reports received from the member schools. From this beginning, rules to govern high school football play were written and improved upon, until the largest program in the world was formed. As stated by Ratliff(54), high school football cannot be surpassed...in color, thrills, drama, and in producing many great athletes, who have made lasting marks in the history of sports.

Personal and social values can be attained in sports competition, but these objectives are not automatic and to a great degree, they depend upon leadership. Accroding to Bourne(4), we protect in interscholastic programs the individual and the program. This is done in many ways-limited seasons, eligibility rules, age rules, limited number of games, and so on.

The fundamental function of the physical educator is to understand each student's needs in order to give him adequate guidance and to adapt programs to meet his needs. Clarke(10) emphasizes that if these functions are to be accomplished efficiently, measurement is indispensable, for orderly progress cannot be achieved without the guidance that intelligent use of measurement provides.

In a broader sense, there are greater facets to athletics than just winning or being the best; one of these is rewards, the intangible reward of the self-satisfaction of physical sacrifice felt by all athletes. According to Cokins(11), "all athletes" includes the everyday, average athlete at the high school level.

The role of sports is more important today than it has ever been in the history of athletics. Today, our lives are characterized by automation, increased leisure time, space exploration, scientific discoveries, and increased tensions...both at home and abroad. High school football can make a valuable contribution to physical fitness, skillful performance, ability to relax, and promotes sound values. The competition of games and contests offered through the sport of football furnish opportunities for self-discovery, self-expression, self-acceptance, and selfdiscipline. Football is one field in which the circumstances of birty, color, race, and creed are disregarded and the individual is measured by performance and by deed.

To achieve the desired outcomes of football requires effective leadership, appropriate activities, good organization, and sound policies within the school system. These outcomes should be based on a sound philosophy of athletics and education.

In order to measure the outcomes of the football program, each school district should have an adequate system for keeping records of their achievements. If records are kept in the memory of the coaches only, they will be lost over a period of time in the changing of personnel.

By making this historical study and recording the past history of football at Magnolia, future coaches and others will find it easier to look up records, as well as to use these records as guidelines for recording their achievements in the future.

Statement of the Problem

If an athlete asks a coach whether or not his school has beaten an opponent in the past and when, the coach should be able to tell him.

This was not possible at Magnolia High School. There are no written records of past football activities available at this school. It is necessary to spend many hours of research to uncover the most meager information, and sometimes even then it is impossible.

Purpose of the Study

The purpose of this study is to present a history of football at Magnolia High School, Magnolia, Texas. The history of football at Magnolia will be organized chronologically, giving schedules and rosters for each year. The schedules will include the date, opponent, game site, and score for each season. It will also include the season won and loss record and the district won and loss record. If the Magnolia "Bulldogs" were involved in district play-offs, results of these games will be reported. Outstanding events, or other information of interest concerning the season, will be included in the "remarks" section of each schedule.

The rosters will include the athlete's number, name, letterman, year, position, and weight. If the athlete made all-district, this information will be included. The team captains, coaching staff, superintendent, and principal for each respective year will also be included on the roster for that year.

A brief resume of the past coaches of Magnolia will be presented, which will include their record at Magnolia, All-District teams coached, and any other pertinent information that might be of interest.

Limitations

Because this study was limited to the study of football only, the other competitive sports in the Magnolia High School athletic program were not researched. However, basketball and track have been played longer than football, and a historical study in these areas would be very beneficial to the coaching staff.

Delimitations

This investigation was limited to the study of the history of football only at Magnolia High School in Magnolia, Texas. Because of the nature of the study, there was limited material available. Most of the research had to be done through personal interviews. Through this source, some information was also obtained from old scrapbooks.

CHAPTER II

REVIEW OF RELATED LITERATURE

The status of present day health education, physical education, and recreation programs is due, at least in part, to previous historical influences. If this assertion is accepted, it is conceivable that past successes or failures might well provide direction or guidance in the conduct of present and future athletic ventures. An understanding of the historical background and related factors affecting or contributing to the development of the program should provide implications for current philosophy and practice. Means(46) suggested that an awareness of the conditions, circumstances, and events that have influenced the development of health education, physical education, and recreation is probably more important today than ever before. This philosophy can well include historical chronological studies in the field of high school football.

Dating back as far as 394 A.D., records were kept of the Olympic Games in Rome. However, Kieran(38) pointed out that these records were lost during the earthquakes which covered the hallowed plains on which the first Olympic Games had started.

A study of history indicates that, as man became more and more civilized, he became more exact in his measurement of human ability. In the field of education, evaluation is a process of judging the effectiveness of educational experiences. Willgoose(73) has given us many measurement devices to use in educational experiences. Likewise, in athletics, statistics provide a process for judging the effectiveness of the athletic experience. It provides a tool with which the experienced coach can

determine the needs of his team.

When you narrow it down, history represents the chronicle of past events. In a broader and more realistic sense, true history takes into account the operating forces that shape these events. History may help in predicting the future insofar as similar influences affect the result, or in suggesting happenings in later years evolving from existing or changing forces(6).

The broad category of history, being a record of the past, allows for a wide variety of studies. Howell (34) pointed out the importance of physical educators primarily concerning themselves with the political, institutional, and biographical approaches when doing historical studies. Political studies in physical education are concerned primarily with national systems of physical education, the effects of nationalism on sport and games, the effects of wars and militarism, and the influence of government. The institutional approach is directed toward the influence of institutions on physical education, sport and games--industrial sport, government decrees, and institutional studies, and the biographical approach is concerned chiefly with the role of individual men and women. By placing too much emphasis on the foregoing categories, there is a resultant neglect of the cultural approach in particular, and also of the chronological and geographical areas. The writer found this to be true regarding the chronological areas, which are directly related to this study. Very few chronological studies could be found in the area of athletics and physical education.

Research was directed toward athletic statistics in an effort to determine what records and reports are encouraged at the high school level. As Nedde(50) pointed out, one aspect of coaching which many coaches neglect

is the compilation and analysis of statistics. His primary interest is in the field of baseball, however he has realized that compiling and analyzing statistics can be an important factor in the success or failure of a team, whether it be in the field of baseball or in other sports.

A football game is an exciting, fast-moving encounter involving a large number of people. As stated by Daugherty and Wilson(18), it is humanly impossible to recall all the action that has taken place and the performance of each player after the game is over. Much of this information can be compiled after the proper collection of game statistics. There are many possible methods of gathering the information needed. Whatever method is employed, all charts and reports should become a part of the coach's permanent files.

Weber and Lamb(71) stressed the fact that the professional physical educator, whether he is engaged in teaching, coaching, or research, has as great an obligation to be statistically literate as any other professional person.

In the field of golf, Buzzerio(9) stated that one of the first requirements for a golf coach is his willingness to work with simple figures. The coach will soon find that statistics which are well organized, kept concisely, and made easy to understand will serve as a valuable instructional and motivational device for the athletes and himself.

Research in the wrestling field revealed how Dake(17) had attempted to do several things with statistics which have resulted in definite and positive improvements in the performance of their wrestlers. Statistics can prove to be stimulating to the individuals, as well as to the team, and analysis not only of one's own performance (individual and team), but of the performance of the opponents can bring beneficial results.

All coaches should keep an accurate account of the performance of their players. The wise coach will not rely on his memory concerning details. Statistics are cold, hard facts, and the coach can utilize them to help him determine the necessity for specific drills for the improvement of indivudual and team play. In the overall organization and planning which the coach is faced with when meeting an opponent, he will find statistics a very helpful ally. All statistics and data pertaining to opponents and home team should be filed for future reference(68).

Statistics are also employed to help the coach use fundamentals to his advantage. Statistical charts help a coach evaluate team and individual progress during both practice and games. Dodd(20) uses many charts and records to dramatize the punting game. He emphasizes the importance of the kicking game and feels that a part of the statistics kept for each game should include yardage of kicks, punts returned, and kickoffs returned--both defensively and offensively, in addition to the net distance of each actual kick. A coach who keeps these statistics for his team will soon realize how important the kicking game is.

It is conceivable, considering that the past does influence the future, that past successes or failures might well provide direction or guidance to the present coaches. The head coach should assume the responsibility for keeping complete budget, equipment, and statistical records according to Hammer(32). During the football season high school coaches are constantly under pressure, much of which is due to lack of time. In most high schools, the coaches are educators first and coaches part of the time. This situation leaves the coach with a limited number of hours for football, and many coaches neglect keeping good statistical records because of this lack of time and the fact that many times he is not aware of the value to be received later from good records.

It is important that data pertaining to specific contests and sports seasons be available when needed. Regardless of the size of the school system, there should be some systematic method for keeping basic items of information concerning every athletic event. Forsythe(23:129) suggests the following list of items of information concerning which permanent records should be kept:

- 1. Finances, including receipts and disbursements for contests and seasons.
- 2. Contracts with officials and other schools, with financial payments indicated and receipted.
- Score of contest and comment on any outstanding occurrences.
- Record of participants in contests. Often a scorebook will furnish this information, but not always. File eligibility lists of both competing schools.
- 5. Ratings of athletic officials used. These are often requested by state associations, and they also are helpful in selecting officials for the following year.
- 6. Weather conditions prior to and during contests.
- 7. Photographs from newspapers and writeups of games.

Some athletic directors may desire to keep all contracts, eligibility lists, financial reports, and the like, for all contests during a season filed under each of the above separate headings. They feel that it is better if groups of related material are filed separately. In other cases, there has been the feeling that all the data in connection with an athletic contest should be filed together. This means that all of the seven items in the preceding paragraph could be found in one file or envelope. There are certain records of contests that have to be made soon after their conclusion to be accurate, and a form on a file folder or envelope seems to be one logical place for them. Regardless of the form or system used, each and every athletic department should devise some method for compiling this information in a way in which it can be kept in a permanent record file. The Wichita, Kansas(23) public schools have adopted the use of a very good form. This form incorporates several of the seven previously mentioned necessary permanent records. It provides spaces for opponents, game site, event, date, scores, and weather conditions. It also has an allotted space for information concerning the officials used and a record of contestants allowing for name, class in school, position played, time played, and points scored. On the reverse side of this form is a form for the financial report. This provides for both receipts and expenditures of the event. This form is a most complete data sheet for an athletic contest if filled out accurately and completely.

Healey(33) cautions that the person in charge of statistics should be familiar with football, the personnel of the team, and defensive and offensive formations.

In the case of football, the University Interscholastic League furnishes a Football Report Blank which contains all of the pertinent information concerning each game. If a copy of this report is kept in a permanent record file, the school would have a pretty complete record of the basic information concerning the games played.

Another form was designed by Griffin(30), which could serve as a composite report of seasons play in any one activity. It provides space for the dates, the team played, and where the game was played, the time of the event, the officials, and the scores. There is also a space for the coaches and student managers to record their names. In a system where the turnover of personnel is large, which is true in many of the small school districts, records of personnel is important--particularly in later years for one doing a history of the sports activity of a school.

No standard set of forms for physical education and athletic records

and reports has been devised according to Hughes and French(35). Extreme standardization is neither feasible or desirable, since conditions vary so widely. Too many forms will prove wasteful; too few means incomplete information. However, much of the usefulness and prestige of a department of physical education and athletics is closely related to the spirit and efficiency that characterize the office.

Rogers(57) has devised some very useful charts in the field of basketball that can be adapted to most other sports. Recognizing that very often newspapers and colleges want information on certain players, he keeps a running total sheet, and then enters information on the individual's sheet at the end of each season. Information is then easily accessible in a short time.

Granger(27) compiled a complete record of the entire athletic program for Splendora High School in Splendora, Texas during 1968-69. In the football section, two reports were kept for each game--one entitled "Game Results" and one entitled "Game Statistics." The game results report was a report of the game each week for all of the teams in District 26 A, giving the season standing and the district standing. The game statistics covered statistics for Splendora and their opponent each week in first downs-passing, first downs-rushing, first downs-total, passes attempted, passes completed, yards gained by passing, yards gained by rushing, total yards gained, number of punts, average yards per punt, fumbles, fumbles lost, opponents passes intercepted, penalties, and yards lost by penalties. Individual statistics for Splendora covered pass receiving, punting, punt returns, kick off returns, passing, and rushing. A report entitled "Final Recap - Season Statistics," was also compiled and presented a complete recap of the weekly game statistics reports for Splendora.

Another report that is of value to both coaches and players is the football manual. Pudlowski(53) suggests that the player's manual is one more of the records that coaches could keep in order to make it easier on themselves. This manual is a booklet that contains copies of mimeographed information written and published by the coach and distributed by him to all of his athletes. A football player's manual will save valuable time for the coach and will contribute to better coaching. It will serve as a teaching guide for the coach and as a study guide for his athletes. A11 pertinent administrative detail and football information are included in the manual. Thus, any confusion or misunderstanding which might arise in a player's mind concerning practice and game procedures is eliminated. Definite standards, which all players are able to understand, are established. Furthermore, because the manual is arranged in such an organized and efficient manner, it should be of assistance in instilling an attitude of confidence in a football team.

If a coach adopts the use of the manual technique and is successful, he may wish to revise it each year. If he follows this procedure, he will have something to use in measuring his own development as a student of football.

In 1969-70, Granger(28) published a Rules and Regulations Handbook for the students at Splendora High School, as well as one for the coaches. These handbooks set out policies concerning training rules, workouts, participation, personal rules, care of athletic equipment, injuries, rules on the field and in the dressing room, transportation policies, awards policies and some of the specific University Interscholastic League rules. Also included in this handbook was a schedule of the games for the 1969 season.

Bryant(7) has strongly encouraged recognition of the defensive players. According to him, playing defensive is the toughest assignment in football. Therefore, favorable publicity is a morale builder to the defensive squad. By keeping statistics on the defensive game, the players can be sold on the challenge of defense and its importance to the game.

Graves(29) also believes in selling the defensive game to the players. He has devised an overall defensive run record chart showing total defensive records at each hold. Next he has an overall defensive pass record chart showing pass defense by areas. He also uses an individual defense record chart showing results of plays directed at a particular defense. At the end of the season, a defensive report is made--with statistics showing records of overall defense, the defensive record of each defense, and an analysis with recommendations for how to correct failures.

Dietzel(19) has emphasized the importance of the scouting report and the importance of keeping these reports from year to year. He says that after writing a brief summary, a copy of the scouting report should be filed in a safe place for future reference.

Certainly all high schools do not employ large enough coaching staffs to keep all of the desired records, but some of the reports suggested can be incorporated in all high school programs. It is the administrative function, therefore, to insure the continuance of existing order. Shepard(61) concluded that its fundamental aim is to "carry on." Organizations that are vital and dynamic should see that the progress of their program is recognized and add to the information stored up each year.

Football is one of our great American heritages, and it is the responsibility of all coaches to guard, guide, defend, nurture, and protect it--to see that the "termites" (evil forces) from within or without do not destroy that which contributes so much to our way of life(12). One of the ways we can protect it is to keep good, complete records.

Historical Studies

In 1952, Parker(51) made a study of the Football History of Sam Houston State Teacher's College. Parker's study was instigated by much the same motive as the writer's--the need for past information that was not readily available. His research was done from school annuals, school newspapers, and personal interviews with past coaches and school personnel.

Cross(16) did a similar study in 1952 on the History of Track and Field Meets at Sam Houston State Teacher's College. In this study, the author attempted to show the progression of field and track at Sam Houston State Teacher's College and associated schools. Cross employed much the same methods as Parker in his research. Methods used in these studies were also employed by the writer.

Anderson(1) conducted an investigation in 1965 of the History of the Men's Northwest Regional Softball Tournament from 1944 to 1964. He obtained pertinent information from interviews, newspapers, personal scrapbooks, tournament programs, and minutes of the meetings of the Northwest Commissioners of the Amateur Softball Association.

Souvall(62) made a study in 1965 of the Interscholastic Athletics at South High School in Salt Lake City, Utah. He made a chronological review from 1931 to 1965, using all available sources for this Salt Lake City high school.

The University Interscholastic League(14)

The University Interscholastic League keeps a record of all member

school's football activities each year in the form of game reports. Each team is required to make a complete report of every game in duplicate immediately after the game. One report is sent to the state office and one to the chairman of the district committee. The data included in one of these reports are the score, the teams playing, the approximate number in attendance, game site, what districts were represented, a list of all players, and statistics of the game. The officials are also named, along with any comments on their officiating.

The University Interscholastic League is made up of the member schools, and it is a product of their making. The constitution, by-laws, rules, and regulations reflect careful thought, experience, and judgment on how activities should be regulated and controlled for interscholastic competition. Few would agree with every rule, but none can deny they represent the present judgment of the total membership and are subject to revision and change as the membership sees fit.

The formation and revision of policies and rules governing the University Interscholastic League is similar to the passage of laws and amendments to the constitution of our state and federal government. The member schools and their representatives are analogous to the people in the process of the state or federal government constitutional changes. The Legislative Council of the League is similar to the state or federal legislature, the Directors, e.g., Director, Athletic Director, Music Director, Drama Director, and Journalism Director, constitute the administration. The State Executive Committee at the state level and the District Executive Committee make up the judicial system of the League.

The University Interscholastic League was first organized in December, 1910, at the State Teachers' Meeting at Abilene. Any public school in

Texas below the collegiate rank that is under the jurisdiction of and receives apportionment from the Texas Education Agency is eligible for membership with the exception of schools for defectives and correctives.

The District Executive Committee is composed of superintendents or their designated administrators from member schools. Each participating school shall have at least one vote. The District Executive Committee's duties are to enforce all rules and regulations and to settle all disputes and all questions of eligibility arising inside the district.

The University Interscholastic League serves close to 3,000 schools in League contests. Therefore, they are not able to keep information at their finger-tips covering a particular activity within a particular district. The office in Austin was contacted in the search for information concerning Magnolia's past football history. The University Interscholastic League office advised that the information needed was possibly available on microfilm, but it would be necessary for someone to go to Austin and search their film records. Therefore, this is not a ready source of information concerning past high school football activities.

Collegiate Football Records

While high schools are noted for not keeping complete records and reports, colleges usually have very concise and accurate reports. Royal(58) can take a look at the figures on his team's athletic accomplishments with ease because of good records. All through his book, he cites records to prove his point. It does not take him long to look at the records and quote when, where, and how the University of Texas "Longhorns" performed at any given time. Booker(3) reported that a Prairie View athletic team has never finished last in any sport. He went on to give a report on all of Prairie View A & M College's outstanding seasons, which would not have been possible had they not kept good records.

In searching the <u>Information Please Almanac</u>(24), all kinds of information having to do with collegiate football records was found. Scores of games going back as far as 1902 were found. The Heisman Memorial Trophy Winners from 1935 through 1969 were named. The Heisman Memorial Trophy is presented annually by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York City to the Nation's outstanding college football player, as determined by a poll of sportswriters and sportscasters. Statistics can be found from this source on all of the annual major bowl college football games, along with the National College Football Champions.

Statistics have been a part of collegiate football just about as long as the game has been known; therefore, records are more readily available at this level. Press associations and newspapers have assigned writers to report football conflicts for almost fifty years(48). Although more writers and more radio and television sportscasters have been engaged during the past twenty years in reporting football than any other major sport, it was not until 1941 that the writers organized into an association. No major football game on the college front escapes the eyes of members of the association. Through most of the states, even in Honolulu, from the congested population centers through the more sparsely settled strongholds of football, the association is represented.

The purposes of the Football Writers Association of America(43:375) are:

1. To promote the best interests of football.

- To encourage and recognize outstanding achievements in sportsmanship, in play, coaching, sports writing, or in other fields contributing to the advancement of the game, by awarding trophies or citations for exceptional performance.
- 3. To standardize the forms and methods in the compilation of football statistics.
- 4. To secure better facilities and better regulation of working conditions in the football stadium pressboxes.
- 5. To bring closer friendship among the writers of football throughout the United States.
- 6. To promote, through the mutual exchange of opinions and viewpoints and otherwise, better understanding and harmony between the football writers as a group and those with whom they work, the coaches, players, athletic directors, publicity directors, faculty representatives, conference commissioners and others.

Football's Man of the Year was the first award of the Football Writer's Association of America. Inaugurated in 1942, it goes annually to the person adjudged by the Football Writers Association members to have made, through his character, leadership, initiative or ability, the greatest contribution to the game(43).

Records were found on collegiate football pertaining to almost any category one would care to investigate. The U.S.A. College Football Champions(47) lists the team champions from 1883 to 1949, with selections made by the Helms Athletic Foundation, Los Angeles, after conference with authorities and record keepers on sport. College All-Time Records compiled by Ray Byrne(47) of Pittsburgh gives the Won-Lost-Tied record for 96 major colleges since they began playing football. These records cover a 63-year span from 1885 to 1949. A few of the high records are, Notre Dame with but 77 losses over this 63-year span led with a percentage of .843, having won 388 games, with 30 ties. The Irish are followed by Yale, Harvard, Princeton, Pennsylvania, Michigan, and Minnesota. To illustrate what the game of football can do for a person, Knute K. Rockne(21) was an immigrant boy from Norway who became the greatest of all football coaches. More than anyone else, he popularized the game and made Notre Dame, where he was head coach from 1918 until his death in 1931, the country's outstanding football institution. During his thirteen-year regime, his teams won 105 games, lost 12, and were tied 5 times--a record no other coach can claim.

Professional Football Records and Statistics

Professional football, now firmly established, is an outgrowth of inter-collegiate football. The first professional game was played in 1895(24) at Latrobe, Pennsylvania. The National Football League was founded in 1921. The All-American Conference went into action in 1946. At the end of the 1949 season the two major play-for-pay circuits merged, retaining the name of the older league. In 1960, a rival circuit, the American Football League, began operations. In 1970, the leagues merged, completing plans begun in 1966. The organization retained the older league's name, the National Football League. There were 28 clubs, divided into two major divisions.

The 1960's was the decade when professional football became the magic sport in the United States. Kramer(39) wrote a book about the great Vince Lombardi, who dominated the professional football scene during the 1960's. Lombardi was coach of the Green Bay Packers during the era of the '60s.

Statistics from 1941-1969 on the longest plays in rushing, passing, punt returns, punts, field goals; in Career Leaders in rushing, passing, total offense, pass receiving, scoring, and kick scoring is readily available from <u>The Encyclopedia of Sports</u>(48) or the <u>Information Please</u> <u>Almanac</u>(24). Through 1969, forty-two greats have been chosen by the Helms Hall Professional Football Hall of Fame(67).

The All-Star game, originated by the late Arch Ward, sports editor of The Chicago Tribune, is an annual classic held at Soldier Field, Chicago, in which the best of the college senior players of the preceding season and the championship team of the National Football League meet for the benefit of charitable institutions of all denominations. A trophy is presented to the outstanding college player, as determined by the judges, as the most valuable to his team in the game(48).

CHAPTER III

PROCEDURES

As pointed out in the related research, the broad category of history, being a record of the past, allows for a wide variety of studies. The procedure followed in this study was: (1) searched school publications, (2) searched local newspapers, (3) made personal interviews, and (4) compiled the data into schedules and rosters. This procedure follows the generally accepted approach used by Anderson(1), Cross(15), Parker(46), and Souvall(56) in their research.

School Publications

The first school publication researched was the school annual, the <u>Bulldog(8)</u>. The annuals for all of the thirty years covered by this study were gathered from the school library. The first step was to make tentative schedules from the information available in the annuals. Blanks were left in the schedules for the years that were incomplete, to be filled in after further investigation. Many times the annual revealed only the teams played and the scores of the games.

Boxes of files, which had been stored in the attic of Magnolia High School, were searched for pertinent information. Copies of the school newspapers for December, 1951, January, 1952, March, 1952, October, 1952, and November, 1952 were uncovered by this source. The December, 1951 issue confirmed scores for the game with Navasota on September 14, 1951. The January issue confirmed All-District members for 1951. The March issue listed the lettermen for 1951. The October, 1952 issue confirmed the date of the game with Milano as October 24. The November, 1951 issue

confirmed the homecoming game. This issue also carried scores for the Milano and Lexington games. These were the only copies of school newspapers uncovered through this research.

Programs were found in the same files for games in 1948, 1949, 1950, 1954 through 1961, and 1964 through 1971. In most instances, the programs for the games included rosters--giving the athlete's numbers, names, positions, and in some instances, weights. Rosters were set up from this source, leaving blanks where information was not available so that it could be filled in later. The programs also included a schedule showing opponents and dates for the season. Programs for Bi-District or Regional games usually carried complete schedules.

Newspapers

The office of the Tomball Tribune and the Spring Tribune were visited in an effort to confirm or establish information on some of the missing data for the schedules and rosters already set up. Copies of issues back as far as 1960 were available at this source; however, no information of any value was found here.

The Conroe Courier office was visited also, but their back issues of publications were not readily available. The Montgomery County Library did have copies of the Conroe Courier on filmstrip for all of the period being researched. The September 18, 1945 issue of the Courier carried a story of a meeting called by Montgomery County School Superintendent, Keith Stuart, to organize a six-man football district to participate in the University Interscholastic League. This district was to be effective in the Fall of 1946. The April 24, 1947 issue carried an article on the establishment of eleven-man football teams, to be effective in the Fall of 1947. Other information gleaned from the Courier served to confirm information already established from other sources.

Personal Interviews

After researching the foregoing sources, the writer began making personal interviews in an effort to complete the tentative schedules and rosters already set up. An article was run in the local newspapers advising of the historical study being undertaken and requesting anyone with pertinent information to contact the writer. Many of the interviews were a result of these articles.

Numerous interviews with Coach Swann(64), present Head Coach and Athletic Director at Magnolia, proved to be an invaluable source of information. He supplied the game sites for games he had coached. He was also able to verify much of the information from the school annuals.

A personal interview with past Magnolia Superintendent and Coach Tom R. Ellisor(22) uncovered much more information. He provided game sites for 1941 and 1942 and confirmed the scores for those two seasons. Ellisor was also able to verify the time as 1946 when Magnolia became a member of the University Interscholastic League. He also provided or confirmed the names of coaches from 1941 to the time Swann came to Magnolia.

More information was obtained through talking with some of the people who have lived in the Magnolia area for many years. Mrs. Bertie Brently(5), who runs a Beauty Shop in Magnolia, was able to furnish posters of the Magnolia Football Schedules for the years 1957, 1958, and 1959. The scores had been written in for many of the games on these posters.

Mrs. Lou Macik(45) sent posters of the Magnolia schedules for 1955, 1956, and 1957. Mrs. Macik is a past graduate of Magnolia. She is presently the Librarian and Mr. Macik is the School Counselor at Magnolia. Mr. Wayne Seals(59), a 1957 graduate of Magnolia, shed some light on the 1956 season. He now operates a service station in Magnolia. He was able to correct information on the Iola game in 1956. Seals also furnished the writer with the 1957 school annual, which confirmed the opponents and scores and furnished the lettermen for that season.

Coach Gayle McGinty(42), Assistant Football and Head Track Coach for Magnolia from 1958 through 1963, also furnished game sites and dates for games during that period. McGinty is a graduate of Sam Houston State Teacher's College and has lived in the Magnolia area all his life. He is now in charge of the Physical Education Program in the Junior High School at Magnolia.

Coach Dean Shaver(60), Head Football Coach for the 1961-62 seasons, was interviewed over the telephone. He verified some of the scores and corrected others for that season.

Coach Gene Rogers(57), Head Coach and Athletic Director during the 1958, 1959, and 1960 seasons, was also interviewed by telephone. He confirmed scores and furnished the games that were homecoming games for these seasons.

Mrs. Mildred Rickett(55), a certified teacher and graduate of Sam Houston State University, was interviewed regarding the 1948-49 season. Mrs. Rickett is a 1949 graduate of Magnolia High School, and is presently a housewife in Magnolia.

W. O. "Soapy" Johnson(36) was interviewed concerning his methods of compiling high school statistics for the Houston area high schools, as well as for the collegiate and professional teams in the area. Johnson is the chief athletic statistician in the Houston area. He has compiled forms for use by the high schools that assist him in gathering the information at that level. He also handles statistics for the University of Houston, Rice University, and the Houston Oilers. Johnson is employed by Hughes Tool Company, Houston, Texas and does statistical work on a contract basis. He is considered by most coaches to be a leader in the field of athletic statistics. He has made attempts through the Texas High School Coaches' Association to get a standardized method for reporting high school statistics throughout the state.

Jim McLemore(44), Publicity Director for the Houston Oilers, was interviewed at his office in Houston. He furnished statistical information compiled by the Oiler's staff at the end of a season. These statistics cover individual records for passing, rushing, receiving, punting, punt returns, kickoff returns, interceptions, and kicking. The team statistics cover total first downs, total offense yards, rushing offense, passing offense, touchdown passes, punting yards, total return yards, fumbles, and penalties. Total points covers points made by touchdowns, point after touchdowns, safties, and field goals. Final results for the season and total attendance records were also shown on this recap.

Bill Whitmore(72), Sports Information Director for Rice University, was also interviewed at his office in Houston regarding the forms they use for reporting game results to the National Conference. This form includes rushing, scoring, passing, punting, punt returns, interception returns, kickoff returns, fumble returns, own fumbles, and penalties. There is also a section for summarizing the times carried, yards gained, yards lost, and net yardage. The score is also reported by quarters. A copy of this game report is furnished each team, the National Conference office, and the wire service.

Frank Krystyniak(40), Sports Information Director at Sam Houston

State University, was interviewed concerning their game report to the Lone Star Conference. This report is called a Summary of Football Game Statistics. The report covers first downs, penalties, and own fumbles for both the home team and the visiting team. Individual statistics for the home team include players names, and records for each in rushing, passing, total offense, receiving, intercepted returns, punting, punt returns, kickoff returns, extra points kicked, and field goals kicked. Additional statistics include scores by quarters, game time, and weather conditions. A scoring summary section is also included. The form used is printed by the National Collegiate Sports Service, 420 Lexington Avenue, New York.

Discussions with a number of high school coaches indicated that they use published statistical forms in their program. One that was mentioned by several of the coaches was printed by HAARCO Statistical Company, Wolfe City, Texas.

Compiling Data

After investigating the above sources, the information was organized chronologically beginning in 1941 through the present time.

The opponent and scores for the 1941 season were obtained from the school annual. The interview with Ellisor(22) revealed the game sites; however, the author was unable to find the dates for the games this season. The athlete's names and classifications for the roster were taken from the school annual also. The number, positions, and weights were obtained from Ellisor. No information was available concerning the lettermen and since Magnolia had not joined the University Interscholastic League, there were no all-district members. All this information was placed on the schedule and roster for 1941.

Again in 1942, the opponents and scores were taken from the annual

and the game sites came from the interview with Ellisor. No dates were obtained for this season. The only information available for the 1942 roster was the names and classifications that were obtained from the annual and the positions, which were obtained from Ellisor. Some of the positions and classifications were not available.

The football program was reorganized in 1944, after it had been eliminated for the 1943 season because of the war. Information for this season was very scarce. The only information available from the annual concerning the schedule was the opponents and the scores. An interview with Preston Kelly(37) revealed three of the game sites and confirmation of the scores. The annual revealed the athlete's names, grades, and the lettermen for the roster. The balance of the information on the roster came from Kelly.

The schedule for 1945 was set up with the opponents and scores from the annual. Dates were not obtained, but Coach Ware(69) furnished the locations for the games. The roster was set up from the annual with the names, numbers, and classifications. Preston Kelly provided the balance of information on the roster for 1945.

In 1946 the majority of the information came from the annual. The schedule was complete with the exception of the game site for the November 27 game. Kelly was able to confirm Conroe as the site of this game. The roster was set up with numbers, names, and classifications from the annual. Positions and weights were obtained from Kelly. No information was obtained concerning lettermen for this year.

In 1947 dates, game sites, and scores were obtained from Kelly and opponents came from the annual. This completed the schedule. The names, classifications for the roster were obtained from the annual, while Kelly supplied the balance of information for that year.

Another Magnolia resident, Mrs. Mildred Rickett(55), furnished information for the 1948 season. No information was available from the annual for this season. Mrs. Rickett furnished the dates, opponents, game sites, and scores for this season from a scrapbook she had kept. The roster was set up with numbers, names, positions, and weights from a copy of a program for the Crosby game. Lettermen were obtained from Mrs. Rickett and classifications from the annual.

In 1949, information for the schedule was obtained chiefly from the annual. Dates, opponents, and scores were taken from the annual and game sites were obtained from Coach Swann(64). All information for the roster was obtained from a copy of the program for the September 30 game with Liberty, with exception of the lettermen and classifications. This information was taken from the annual.

In 1950, the opponents and scores were taken from the annual. Dates and game sites were provided by Coach Swann. For the roster, the numbers, names, classifications, and positions came from the annual. Mrs. Rickett was able to provide weights from a copy of a program she had in her scrapbook.

In 1951, 1952, and 1953, schedules were set up with opponents and scores from the annual. Swann furnished dates and game sites for these years. Concerning the roster, the numbers, names, positions, and classifications were obtained from the annual for each respective year. The lettermen and weights were supplied by personal interview with Jimmy Peacock(52).

The information for 1954 was taken from a copy of the Bi-District program. The only information not available for the schedule from this

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source was the dates, which were taken from the annual. The roster was set up from this same program. Numbers, names, positions, and weights were available from the program. Classifications, lettermen, and alldistrict members were obtained from the annual.

From posters provided by Mrs. Lou Macik(45), complete schedules were set up for 1955, 1956, and 1957. Mrs. Macik had inserted the scores on the posters for each game as it had been played. Rosters for 1955 and 1956 were established from copies of programs. Lettermen and classifications were obtained from the annual. The 1957 roster was set up with all the information from the annual with the exception of the weights, and these were provided by Coach Swann.

Posters for the 1958 and 1959 seasons were supplied by Mrs. Brently(5), with scores written in. This information was confirmed from a copy of a program for each respective year. The roster for 1958 was taken from the annual. The 1959 roster was taken from a copy of a program for October 17 with Montgomery.

The 1960 schedule was set up with dates, opponents, game sites, and scores from a program of the November 24 game with Colmesneil. The information for the roster also came from this source with exception of the classifications and lettermen, which came from the annual.

In 1961, the schedule came from the annual. The roster was obtained from a copy of the program for the Hempstead game on September 15, with exception of the classifications, which were obtained from the annual.

Information for the 1962 and 1963 seasons was very sketchy. Gayle McGinty(42) was interviewed and furnished most of the information. He furnished all of the information on the schedule. The information for the roster was obtained from the annual concerning the numbers, names, positions,

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and classifications. Weights were furnished by McGinty.

Information for the 1964, 1965, and 1966 seasons was obtained from copies of programs. The only information taken from the annual for these seasons was the classifications and lettermen for the roster.

In 1967 the schedule was obtained from a poster furnished by Hugh McCracklin(41). Scores had been filled in on this poster. The roster was taken from a program for the November 3 game with Waller.

In 1968 and 1969 all information was taken from programs.

In 1970 and 1971 statistics were kept by the author and therefore, readily available.

All the schedules and rosters for each year were arranged chronologically, with any remarks of interest made by the persons interviewed showing up in the remarks section of the schedule. By arranging the schedules and rosters in this order, information is readily available to any interested party.

CHAPTER IV

PRESENTATION OF THE HISTORICAL DATA

The information gathered was organized in the following manner: (1) all information on the past coaches of Magnolia High School was sorted and arranged chronologically from 1941 to the present time, (2) the schedules and results were arranged chronologically, (3) the rosters were arranged chronologically, and (4) information of a special nature was collected and treated as highlights.

Coaches

A coach's work is not confined just to the athletic field. He has many responsibilities other than that of turning out an athletic team. He has off-the-field obligations to his players and assistants, fellow coaches, his school, the alumni, the press, and the general public. A coach is likely to be an important person in his community, which makes it very important that he live up to his responsibilities as a citizen. McKay(43) has summed up the coaches' obligation to himself by saying that a coach should live cleanly, deal fairly, work faithfully at his job, uphold the traditions of clean, hard play and good sportsmanship--and maintain self respect. He has a tremendous responsibility to the game itself.

Football, or any other sport, is only as good as the men who coach it. As the records will reveal, Magnolia has enjoyed their share of good coaches.

Tom R. Ellisor(22) coached the first football at Magnolia in 1941, while also serving as the Superintendent of Schools. Ellisor coached for two years. Prior to this time, he had served 27 years as Superintendent.

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He came to Magnolia in 1925 as a teacher and became superintendent in 1927. Ellisor graduated from Sam Houston State Teacher's College, where he majored in Physical Education and minored in Industrial Arts. Magnolia had their first undefeated team under Ellisor's guidance in 1941, with seven wins, no losses, and one tie game. Because football was a new sport in their athletic program, they did not join the University Interscholastic League and participate in district play that first season. Consequently, their first undefeated season failed to win them title recognition. The school administration felt they needed some experience behind them before competing in district play. Records show, however, that they would have won their first year if they had joined the University Interscholastic League--for they beat the team that won district that year. Before retiring from coaching, Ellisor racked up a 10-1-1 record. Upon leaving Magnolia, he went to Van Vleck. He stayed at Van Vleck for twelve years. At the present time, his home is in New Waverly, Texas.

Like many other high schools, Magnolia did not participate in football in 1943. So many boys went into the armed forces that the school was too short of personnel to have a football program.

Magnolia began participation in football again in 1944 with J. E. Little as coach. Little was a graduate of Sam Houston State Teacher's College. He came directly to Magnolia after graduation and coached the Bulldogs to a 4-3-0 season. After one year, Coach Little left Magnolia to go to work for Harris County in Houston, Texas.

The next season, 1945, Harold Ware(69) came to Magnolia to coach the Bulldogs to a 6-2-0 season. Coach Ware came to Magnolia from Splendora. He was also a graduate of Sam Houston State Teacher's College, where he majored in Biology and minored in Physical Education. Ware left Magnolia to go to Tomball. After teaching and coaching for 25 years, he returned to Magnolia in 1971, where he presently teaches Physical Science.

Clark Tippen was the Bulldog's next coach. He came to Magnolia from Sam Houston State Teacher's College. He coached at Magnolia for two years, 1946 and 1947. In 1946 he had an 8-3-0 season and in 1947, a 4-4-0. Up to this time, Magnolia had played six-man football. In 1947 Coach Tippen coached Magnolia's first eleven-man team. Tippen left Magnolia to go to League City.

The fifth coach to head the young Bulldogs was Murray Mitchell in 1948. Mitchell was only with the Bulldogs for one year with a 3-7-0 season. He was another graduate of Sam Houston State Teacher's College.

Coach H. H. Swann(64) was the next coach to come to Magnolia High School. From Hermleigh, Texas, Swann came to Magnolia for a nine-year stay. He was at Magnolia from 1949 to 1958, and then left Magnolia in 1958 to go to Van Horn for two years and then to Tomball for four years. In district play during this nine-year period, Swann had a 72-19-6 record. He won four District Championships, two Bi-District, and one Regional. Swann was to return to Magnolia in later years.

During Swann's absence, Gene Rogers(56) coached the Bulldogs in 1958, 1959, and 1960. During these three years, Rogers' Bulldogs won three District Championships, two Bi-District Championships, and two Regional Championships. Coach Rogers boasts the first undefeated and untied team in the history of football at Magnolia. Rogers' record for this three-year period was 28-6-1. In 1959, after losing to Katy, Magnolia started on a long winning streak by defeating Klein 44-14. From here the Bulldogs racked up 22 straight wins. Coach Rogers had a fine record at Magnolia, and left to go to Bishop, Texas. In 1961, Dean Shaver(60) came to Magnolia as coach. Shaver won two District Championships and one Bi-District. In 1961, Magnolia won the 22nd game in their winning streak in a game with Iola--opening the 1961 season. They lost to Waller 6-0 to end their winning streak, which had started in 1959. Coach Shaver brought the Bulldogs back after losing to Waller to win their next eight games before losing to Buffalo in Bi-District. During his two year stay, Shaver had a 16-5-2 record.

Roland Jones came to coach the Bulldogs in 1963. He had a record of 18-13-1 during his three year stay. In 1965, the Bulldogs won District, Bi-District, and Regional by defeating Van Vleck 21-0. This was the last time the Bulldogs won Regional. In 1965 Magnolia was rated as the number one team in the state in Class B ball. Jones left Magnolia and went to Livingston, Texas.

Swann returned to Magnolia in 1966, where he is still Head Coach and Athletic Director. Swann coached Magnolia for fifteen of the thirty years they have had football on their schedule of activities. He has had ten District Championship Clubs, five Bi-District, and one Regional. During his years of coaching at Magnolia, Swann has coached a number of boys who have gone on to make names for themselves in the field of athletics as well as other fields. One of the most outstanding in the athletic field would be Buddy Dial. Dial made All-State honors in high school; All-American at Rice University; and All-Pro in the professional ranks. Several past athletes of Coach Swanns were contacted in doing an article paying tribute to him(26). The following statements reflect their feelings about him.

Cecil Groves(31) graduated from Magnolia in 1957. He received his Doctor of Philosophy Degree from the University of Texas and is now

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Vice-President of Delgoda Junior College in New Orleans. He has this to

say about Coach Swann:

Coach Swann could take a club with a minimal degree of talent and fashion a fine football team! I think probably one of the most important things Coach Swann taught me was to continually strive towards excellence-to continue to drive to be better than we were. This was brought out in a number of ways--his effort was always toward perfection. We didn't have a complicated, sophisticated offense--we had a well-oiled, efficient formation. Another thing he drilled into us was not to give up, to continually strive to win. I remember my senior year--we lost our first two games, one of them to a club that had never beaten us before. We felt pretty bad, but he kept at us to get in there and win and not to give up just because we had lost two games. We went on to win Regional that year. These two things, striving toward excellence and not giving up, have stayed with me and helped me all these years.

Gerald Applewhite(2) was another of Coach Swann's athletes. He graduated from Magnolia in 1956. Applewhite played football for Coach Swann from 1953 through 1956 in the back position and has the following to say about Swann:

> Coach Swann was very helpful to me. I lost my father when I was quite young and Coach Swann taught me a lot. One of the things he instilled in me, and all the boys, was a strong sense of discipline. In fact, he demanded discipline and it certainly has helped me in the years since. He also gave me a keen awareness of competitiveness, not only in athletics, but in other endeavors as well. The training he gave me, the way he taught us that you had to make sacrifices to achieve a certain goal, has been very helpful to me. I can't say enough to express the good influence Coach Swann made in my life.

Max Graham(25) was another young athlete inspired by Coach Swann. Graham graduated in 1959 and is now a high school coach at Bellville, Texas. In the following statement, he gives Swann credit for his becoming a coach:

> Coach Swann definitely influenced my becoming a coach. I played for Coach Swann from the 7th grade through

the llth grade, when he left Magnolia for a short time. He built the program at Magnolia. He started the program with nothing, you might say. It's hard to define in words the spirit he put into you. He probably got more out of average material than any other coach I've ever been associated with.

Leadership is essential in any educational activity, but in athletics leadership is of paramount importance. As evidenced by the statements taken for the aforementioned article, a coach has the opportunity to help mold the character of adolescent youth and every coach should realize this and take advantage of this opportunity.

Schedules and Results

Football, as a competitive sport, began at Magnolia High School in 1941. Since that time, with the exception of 1943, it has been a continuous sport. It began with the Superintendent of Schools coaching the team and has grown to have fourteen District Championship teams, eight Bi-District, and four Regional. Magnolia has an overall record of 216 wins, 80 losses, and 13 ties.

The information contained in the following schedules pertains to the games played and outstanding events concerning the seasons. It is arranged by dates, opponents, game sites, and scores. Season results and district results have been recapped. Any information of special interest has been treated as "remarks." This covers such items as the district classification, homecoming games, and remarks made by coaches interviewed concerning outstanding plays or events.

> The record of their first season does not bear out the opinion that they needed experience. They won seven and tied one their very first season. At the finish of the season, they beat the team that won the district championship...New Waverly.

The New Waverly game was brought to an exciting climax when Morris Damuth drop kicked for the extra point to win the game.

Coach Ellisor(22), coach for the Bulldogs in 1942, was interviewed concerning this season and was able to provide the game sites. 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Remarks: Magnolia organized a six-man team shortly after the opening of school. They had not had a team in 1943 due to the war; there-fore, 1943 found them starting over again in this sport.

Before meeting Magnolia, Willis had won several games with other opponents. This was the first test for Magnolia and they hadn't had enough practice to make a very good showing. However, by the time they met Shepherd, they had gained in confidence and made a better showing. They gained momentum and were victorious in their next three games. Willis came back though to humble them again by beating them 52-6. The last game against New Waverly was won by forfeit due to illness and bad weather.

Again this year, information concerning dates and game sites was very sketchy. The writer was not able to obtain any of the dates and only three of the game sites for this season.

Rosters

The rosters are also arranged in chronological order, beginning in 1941 to the present time.(Appendix A) The information is organized according to number, name, letterman, year, position, and weight. All-District and All-State choices are indicated by an asterisk (*).

This chronologue of rosters supplies a ready source of reference on past athletes in the football field at Magnolia.

Highlights

The highlights point out some of the most outstanding events that have taken place in the football program at Magnolia. Statistics presented in the schedules and rosters have been summarized and brought out in the following highlights.

Table I gives Magnolia's district record for the 26 years they have participated in University Interscholastic League Competition. Out of this 26 years, they went 12 years undefeated in district play. They went five years, from 1958 through 1962, without a district loss in Class B. Their total record for 26 years in district play is 105-23-3.

The Bulldogs scored the most points against an opponent in a single game against Saratoga in 1959 with a score of 68-8. The most points scored on the Bulldogs was in 1970 by Tomball with a score of 55-0. The highest total points scored in a single game was in the game between Somerville and Magnolia in 1959 with Magnolia winning 64-22.

The most points scored in a season was 510 points against the opponent's 130 in 12 games in 1959 under Coach Gene Rogers.

The most points scored in district play was Magnolia 215 - Opponents 46 in 1954 in five district games under Coach Swann.

The least number of points scored on Magnolia in a season was in 1949 with just 24 points. This season consisted of ten games.

The least number of points scored on Magnolia in district play was six points in 1958 under Coach Rogers.

Magnolia's poorest season was in 1963 with a record of 1-8-1. The Bulldogs scored 84 points against the opponents 238.

Magnolia's best season was in 1960 with a record of 12-0-0 under Coach Rogers.

The longest winning streak in Magnolia's history has been a 22 game winning streak beginning in 1959 and ending in 1961.

Out of 309 games played from 1941 through 1971, Magnolia has shut out 80 teams and been shut out 28 times.

Magnolia has had an outstanding history of high school football. Table II gives a record for Magnolia versus the ten most-often played teams in their history of football. This includes all of the teams that Magnolia has met 12 or more times.

During all the time Magnolia has had football in their schedule, only seven boys have made All-District three years. Alford Smith was the first, making All-District in 1949, 1950, and 1951. Jimmy Peacock was next, making All-District in 1951, 1952, and 1953, followed by Gerald Applewhite, Bobby Goodson, Cecil Groves, and Wayne Seal--all making All-District in 1954, 1955, and 1956. John Shivers was the latest to match these records, making All-District in 1968, 1969, and 1970.

Magnolia produced one athlete who went on to play professional ball. Buddy Dial graduated from Magnolia in 1955. He made All-State at Magnolia, All-American at Rice University, and All-Pro playing professional ball. Dial retired from the professional ranks with the Dallas Cowboys.

CHAPTER V

SUMMARY

Football became a part of the athletic program at Magnolia more than thirty years ago. However, information on the early years of football was very hard to obtain because records were not kept in permanent record files of the athletic activities. Part of the reward of participating in football comes from the pride of having belonged to a winning team. It would have been hard for a Magnolia coach to use the past as a basis for encouraging the "best" prior to this study, for there were no records to substantiate that Magnolia had really ever been the best in the past.

The competitive sport of football began at Magnolia in 1941. From 1941 through the 1945 football season, Magnolia did not belong to the University Interscholastic League. They played a regular schedule of games each year, however, with the exception of 1943. Through 1946, Magnolia played six-man football. In 1946, they joined the University Interscholastic League, but continued playing six-man ball that first year in League play. In 1947, they began playing eleven-man football.

Since joining the University Interscholastic League, Magnolia has won fourteen District Titles, eight Bi-District Titles, and four Regional Titles. They have an overall record of 216 wins, 80 losses, and 13 ties, for an alltime percentage of .718.

Conclusions

Magnolia has had a history of football that would make any school proud. However, like so many other high schools, records were not kept to back up this boast. They have had many outstanding seasons, and in fact

were rated as the Number One team in the state in 1965. If records had been kept on past seasons, these facts could have been used more effectively to encourage and motivate athletes. As was pointed out in this study, one aspect of coaching which many coaches neglect is the compiling and analyzing of statistics.

In conclusion, it is humanly impossible for anyone to recall all of the action that has taken place or the performance of each of the players after a football game is over. Therefore, every coach should accept the responsibility of seeing that statistics are compiled during the game and that these statistics are gathered after every game and put into appropriate report form to be filed in permanent record files.

Recommendations

This research was done to present a composite history of football at Magnolia High School from the beginning, 1941, through the present time. It is organized and presented to make all materials readily available to the reader. Considering the many difficulties encountered in collecting the data contained herein, the author makes the following recommendations:

1. The Athletic Department should keep a report on each football game, and at the end of each season, the information should be placed in a permanent record file. The report on each game should include: (a) date of the game, (b) game site, (c) opponent and scores, (d) complete roster with team members, classification, position played, weight, lettermen, all-district and all-state selections, and (e) game statistics.

2. A copy of the report required by the University Interscholastic League should be kept in the Athletic Department in a continuous permanent record. This file should not be a seasonal file, but should be added to

each season, so that all of the reports would be together.

3. Someone on the staff should keep a scrapbook of all publicity received by the football team during any one season. This scrapbook should also be placed in a permanent record file.

4. A systematic method of collecting the information necessary should be established and followed each season. The author has collected information for the 1971 season and had it bound and placed in the Athletic Department files, as well as in the School Library. This is a complete record for District 26 A and Magnolia High School. It is suggested that this is a feasible method to follow in the future to gather this information.

5. Some good forms for gathering statistics are printed by HAARCO Statistical Records, Post Office Box 49, Wolfe City, Texas, 85496. It is recommended that these, or some similar forms, be used in collecting the statistical data at Magnolia High School.

 In order to point out the need for keeping statistical records, it is recommended that more research of this nature should be done.
